


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B84: Now the white group is without any problem, whereas Black still does not have an eye, so white has come out with an advantage of the first scene of the fighting. However, as White cannot expect to invade the upper side, Black is still leading territorially. White has to try to make some territory on the lower side while chasing the black dragon, and the struggle continues.

B66: As seen in the next moves, Black gets inefficient shape here. Maybe it is best to calmly play at B71 (and hope that this gets praised as honte, not devalued as slow, in a high-dan commentary...).

B70: Black cannot play B71, as the Ko after WA - B70 - W72 looks bad for Black.

W73: This might get punished badly if Black chooses the vulgar but apparently efficient style of B1 to B9 in the variation. Probably White should simply jump to W81.

Arend's report from the round in Aachen

Well, I volunteered to write some words on Uni Bonn's first Rhein-Maas-Liga match in Aachen this year; however, I may actually have been a bad choice as a reporter - as usual, my games took longer than most and so I can report little apart from them. (I already fear to be responsible in case my team mate and new Rhein-Maas-Liga organisator Marcel will think about enforcing stricter byoyomi rules in future...)

However, I don't quite think the time on the clock passed by without good reason, as the reader may judge himself: Eric Paré from Liège, against whom I was matched in the first round, decided to leave the all-to-well-known paths in a joseki that usually works *because* the opponent knows and plays it. Honestly: Who would know whether White can resist against the Black peep at B24 with W25? Although this joseki comes up regularly in my games, I didn't know. Anyway, a fighting resulted that we both enjoyed.

It continued towards the the lower center, caused complications in the lower right, found a surprising turning point at the lower left (B4 and B8 ending up captured), and the win wasn't decided until Eric committed a connection oversight in the left center, where the fighting had finally calmed down a bit.

In the meantime my team mate Martin Foikis had lost a group too big against Hermann Raphael, and Karl Koehler would have needed the 2 additional handicap stones to level out the 11-grade difference against Sylvie Multon. Two chess players sitting at the table next to us had played about one game for each move played in our game (they played one blitz of 75-seconds each after another), but the good news was that Marcel Arndt had used his three handicap stones against Vincent Croisier well enough to pull off victory. So the season had begun with a fair 2-2 draw.

It had become late, and at least for my game with Frank Theinen it is fair to say that there were plenty of mistakes on both sides. At the end, there were some more on mine, and Frank was already deservedly on the way to victory when he rescued another big black group that had been dead for about 100 moves. In the game next to us, Marcel had ended up with a 3 point victory against Jens Patommel where he had already believed to be behind. The other two boards shared the wins equally well, and we had another draw.

It was a very enjoyable visit to Aachen. And with the new schedule I am looking forward to meet everyone again in rounds 4-6 -- if not already on the forthcoming tournaments in Cologne, Amsterdam or Herne.

Game: Arend Bayer vs. Eric Paré

Black: Eric Paré, 1d (Baoming Liège)

White: Arend Bayer, 3d (Bonn Uni)

Handicap: 2 stones

Results: White wins

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Comment by Arend Bayer. (Actually, he calls it "a few incomplete remarks" and invites the reader to spot more mistakes on both sides...)

W25: I still don't know what's correct here and would at the moment guess to take the calm route with W26, B25, W32.

W35: A lot of semais could be tried -- e.g. W48, B39, W72. They are all dangerous for both players.

W39: This could lead to a disaster discussed at B42. Another possibility might be W40 - B39 (preventing the double threat of B49) - W43.

W41: Forced, as white cannot allow the 2 stones to be captured in a ladder.

B42: I don't see how white could save the big dragon if Black blocks the corner at B47. No eyes in sight, and the black stones around B24 probably have enough liberties to win the semeai.

B50: A ladder breaker at F4 seems more interesting.

B64: This looks a little like aji keshi (lost potential) to me. Once the white block around W49 has lost another liberty, Black might prefer to give white a shape problem with the eye-stealing tesuji at B75.
